It is the responsibility of the approved provider to ensure that the laundry and hygienic facilities are maintained in a way that does not pose a risk to children, or that allows access that would place children at risk.

The approved provider of an education and care service must ensure that, for each child being educated and cared for by the service, the education and care service premises has at least 3.25 square metres of unencumbered indoor space.	The proposed childcare facility will care for a maximum of 110 children at any one time. This results in a minimum required unencumbered space of 357.5m². The childcare facility proposes 368.2m² of unencumbered indoor space and is therefore compliant with this requirement.
In calculating the area of unencumbered indoor space— (a) the following areas are to be excluded— (i) any passageway or thoroughfare (including door swings); (ii) any toilet and hygiene facilities; (iii) any nappy changing area or area for preparing bottles; (iv) any area permanently set aside for the use or storage of cots; (v) any area permanently set aside for storage; (vi) any area or room for staff or administration; (vii) any other space that is not suitable for children; (b) the area of a kitchen is to be excluded, unless the kitchen is primarily to be used by children as part of an educational program provided by the service. The child care facility proposes 970m² of unencumbered outdoor space and is therefore compliant with this requirement.
In calculating the area of unencumbered outdoor space required, the following areas are to be excluded— (a) any pathway or thoroughfare, except where used by children as part of the education and care program; (b) any car parking area; (c) any storage shed or other storage area; (d) any other space that is not suitable for children. Yes Adequate, developmentally and age-appropriate toilet, washing and drying facilities are provided for use by children within differing age groups. These facilities are located and designed in such a way that enables safe and convenient access for the children, with toilets centrally located between each class room and easily accessible from internal and external spaces. The toilet facilities are broken up so children of similar age groups utilise the same facilities.
110 Ventilation and natural light The approved provider of an education and care service must ensure that the indoor spaces used by children at the education and care service premises— (a) are well ventilated; and (b) have adequate natural light; and (c) are maintained at a temperature that ensures the safety and wellbeing of children.	Yes The design ensures indoor spaces to be utilised by the children will be well-ventilated and have adequate natural light through the provision of windows along all external walls. As such, it is considered suitable provision for ventilation, natural light and temperature control has been incorporated into the design.
